PREPARING FOR THE WET

What to do in the garden now.

What to plant now

Mulch, Mulch, Mulch

- This is the best thing you can do right now
- 1. stops weeds especially if paper is laid first
- 2. stops erosion in heavy rain
- 3. keeps roots cool in hot weather
- 4. provides food for earthworms
- 5 stops nutrients being washed out of soil
- 6. protects the microbes in the soil

Suitable mulches

- Mulch hay
- Sugar cane mulch
- Trimmings from plants put through a shredder
- Lawn clippings are good if left to dry out prior to using and mixed with leaves to stop packing down.
- Up to 150mm deep is fine.

Pruning and composting

- Now is a good time to prune back ornamentals and to clean up the vegie. patch.
- If you have access to a shredder make compost with the trimmings instead of taking them to the tip. If no shredder, cut into pieces no more that 100mm. Let some dry out and then build a compost heap with the green and brown – just add molasses, manure or blood and bone. Moisten as you build and cover top to protect from heavy rain.

Green manuring

- By growing a green crop and then slashing or digging in the plants just as they are about to flower will add nutrients and oranic matter to the soil. If slashing you get a second crop.
- Plants in the Mustard family are excellent green manure plants as the gases given off when the plants decompose kills nematodes.

Seeds suitable for green manure

 Cow pea, Buckwheat, Japanese millet, Lab lab, Mung beans, Mustard, Soybeans, Snake Beans, Sorghum, Crotalaria, Pigeon pea.

 Bird seed has a lot of different seeds which could be used as a green manure crop – cut or dig in before seeds set.

Taro makes an attractive addition to the garden



Plants, cuttings or tubers to plant now

- Aerial Potato, Casava, Coco Yam, Taro,
 Arrowroot, Ginger, Galangal, Turmeric, Yam
- Green leaf spinach type veg. –Brazillian spinach, Ceylon spinach, Egyptian spinach, Okinawa Purple and Green, Kang Kong, Abikia, Surinam spinach, Sweet Leaf, Lebanese Cress, Moringa and Sweet Potato

Seeds or seedlings to plant now

- All melons, pumpkins, cucumbers, and serpent gourd, a good substitute for zucchini.
- Amaranth, asian greens, asparagus, basil, beans, beetroot, capsicum, chilli, carrots, chives, choko, eggplant, looseleaf lettuce, mustard greens, okra, radish, rosella, sweet corn,
- It's a bit late for tomatoes, as they won't set fruit in the hot humid weather, but if you still have some bushes, encourage them to keep producing.

Growing herbs in the tropics

- I have had herbs in large pots for years now.
 Rosemary is the only one I move under cover to escape the heavy rain.
- The thyme, lemon thyme, mint, viet mint, 5 spice, marjoram, chives, garlic chives, basil, shallots are out in the open. Although when planting the parsley I left it in the pot and buried the pot about half way into the ground. This stoped the base from rotting and it survived the wet season.

Potting mix for herbs in the tropics

- To keep herbs through the wet the potting mix must be very free draining. I think the large pots also help as the roots can burrow down to escape the heat.
- Any good potting mixes can be used but add about 30% coarse sand to provide drainage.
- I feed my herbs with worm castings/juice, compost and/or organic liquid fertilizer.
