The Tropical Veggie Patch

The weather has been kind to us this year. But remember the Rain and Cyclone season starts SOON SO get the weeds under control before the rains start. If you don't it will be difficult to spray for weeds because of the rain, speaking from experience.

Raising seedlings will need to happen undercover from heavy rains and if the weather turns really hot, most plants will appreciate some shade. November is traditionally hot and humid but the rain may help.

So what to eat in the next 5 months. Here is a list of what can be grown easily in your garden .

Tree food plants also provide shade.

Moringa, Pigeon Pea, Banana, Plantain, Paw paw, Citrus, Mulberry.

Shrubs.

Ofenga, Aibika, Sweet Leaf (high in protein and a great hedge plant), Asparagus, Tropical Lettuce, Timor Lettuce, Amaranth. Casava for leaf and tubers

Groundcovers for salads.

Okinawa Greens, Sambung Greens, Lebanese Cress, Watercress, Timor lettuce, Ceylon Spinach

Groundcovers for cooking.

Brazilian Spinach, Okinawa, Sambung, Kang Kong, Ceylon spinach, Sweet potato leaves and tubers,

Root crops

Casava, Taro for chips, substitute for potato, Cocoyam substitute for potato, Ginger, Turmeric, Sweet Potato

Vines

Wing Bean, Choko, Lima Bean, Snake Beans, Zucchini Tromboncino, Cucumber, Watermelon, Pumpkin

Herbs

Mint, Spearmint, Parsley, Tarragon, Thyme, Lemon Thyme, Basils, Bunching shallots, Garlic Chives, Chives all make great additions to salads. Oregano,

Marjoram, Galangal, Cardamon, Lemon Grass, Pandan and Rosemary. All will grow here in Cairns all year round.

Tips on how to cook these plants

All the greens will be enhanced with butter which also collects any fat soluble vitamins from the juices. Add ginger and garlic to steamed or stirfried greens. A touch of Apple cider vinegar helps. And cooking with Coconut cream transforms a tropical vegetable dish. Add Bunching shallots to egg dishes, stirfries and rice dishes. Give them a try.

What to plant now - Direct seed leaf amaranth, corn, snake beans, bok choy, rocket, cucumbers, Darwin and open leaf lettuce, pumpkin, radish, melons. Plant some watercress in a shady moist spot, along with Brahmi the memory herb, Lebanese cress and Rungia the mushroom plant, all great for adding to a mixed salad

Herbs - all the basil's, Mexican tarragon, mints, garlic chives, saw tooth coriander, parsley, chives, lemon thyme, thyme, oregano and spices turmeric, ginger, galangal, cardamom, Vanilla, and mother of all herbs for pizza and pasta.

Flowers for us and the Birds and Bees try these proven lovelies - Angelonia, Cosmos, Coleus, Dianthus, Salvias, Basils, Marigold, Pentas, Ixoras, Callistemon, Golden Candle, Sunflowers, Vinca and Zinnias.

This year I grew Queen Anne's lace, it was in a Bee mix as I didn't think it would grow in the tropics but it is beautiful and I will try again next year. Keep learning new things all the time.

More on flowers that make you and the bees happy.

This year I have also spent some time recording and growing an increasing number of trees, shrubs, groundcovers and small plants that flower over a long period during the year. I have three native stingless bee hives so I try to always have flowers for the bees during the heavy rain..

The trees, Moringa, Mock Orange, lots Bananas, Cumquat, Lemon, Lime, Mulberry 3, Elderberry, lots Angels Trumpets, 4 Pawpaw, Bottlebrush, 3 Pigeon Pea, Leea, Palm trees and a Happy plant,

Shrubs, Ixora, Golden Candle, lots of Coleus, Mother of all Herbs, Salvia varieties, Sunflowers, Tomatoes, Zucchini, Pentas, Pineapple sage, Cosmos, Calliandra, Basil cinnamon which flowers all the time. Rocket, Bok choy, Timor lettuce, Justicia,

Groundcovers and small plants, Okinawa spinach, Sambung, Brazilian Spinach and lots of Portulaca, Dianthus, Cuphea, Zinnia, Salvia, Sunflowers dwf, Queen Anns Lace, Thyme, lots Begonias. Brassicas, Cosmos, Capsicum.

My neighbour also have Evodia, gingers and Lillypillies.

It is quite amazing when you take note of the variety of plants that flower. The Queen Annes lace was a surprise, it was in a bee mix otherwise I would not have planted it. The weather has been cool for most of the year so I am assuming it may not grow here in a hot winter, but I will be planting it next year, it is beautiful and the Asian Bees go surfing on the surface of the heads of flowers.

All different sorts of bees love the Angels Trumpet and the perfume is intoxicating early morning and evening.

If you are looking for Tropical Perennial Edible plants as well as Herbs and Flowers, I am selling them through Jonssons Farm Mart at Stockland Earlville. They will take orders if what you want is not on the stand.

PS. We recently revived a couple of gardens at the Manoora Community Garden, they were turned into No Dig Gardens. Watered well, chicken poo added, covered in cardboard and then mulched with wood chips. The only problem is there is lots of Nut Grass and this is going to take a long time to remove. Instead of digging it out which just makes more plants the idea is to shade it out by growing lots of plants as ground covers so they stop the nut grass from getting any light. 

Description: A sedge with brown seed heads subtended by 3-4 leaves at the top of a triangular stem with basal leaves and a creeping wiry rhizome with underground oval tubers or "nuts".

As A Soil Indicator: Low Calcium, Low Phosphorus, High Potassium, High Magnesium, Very high Iron, Low humus in the soil, Compacted soils, Little biology

Life cycle: Perennial grass. Seeds germinate in spring and the plant grows over summer forming rhizomes and tubers and flowers in autumn to winter. Tubers shoot in spring and extend to the surface to produce a basal bulb that produces the leaves. These grow over summer producing more tubers and rhizomes and flower in autumn to winter. Under good conditions plants may flower when they are 3-6 weeks old.

Beneficial: Grazed to a limited extent by horses and cattle but of little forage value. Fragrant roots used in perfumes. Tubers are edible and were a source of food for aborigines. Used to bind soil to prevent wind erosion.

Detrimental: Can act as a host for nematodes and other insects. Not recorded as toxic
