

THE TROPICAL VEGGIE PATCH:

Gardening in the hot, wet, humid Tropics

Another long really hot and humid summer and still a bit to come.

February was a dreadful month to grow anything except tropical vegetables or Chinese greens. Although with a sheltered spot where the rain cant go and some shade cloth you can still grow Rocket and Wild Rocket along with the tropical Tenderleaf Amaranthus for the salad.

The WEEDS are growing better than anything else. I have found the best way to cope is to cover weeds with cardboard and weigh down with hay before the wet sets in, this gives more time for making compost, bokashi or tending the worm farms. The worms have suffered another bad year and most of the adults have died but the baby worms have hatched out are filling the farms again.

Thank goodness for our tropical perennial greens. I grow my Sambung, Brazilian, Okanawan and Ceylon spinachs as ground cover plants under trees, they appreciate the shade in the hot part of the day. Kan Kong and Lebanese Cress will grow very happily in a large well-



watered pot with a tray to hold water, fill the tray with pebbles/sand to stop the mozzies from breeding. Amaranth and Timor Lettuce both self-seed and grow easily all year. Lots of greens for salads, or to steam and stir fry. Let's not forget to use the leaves of the Miracle tree, Moringa for salads and baking.

When cooking greens I use Coconut oil for flavour, my never- ending bunching shallots and garlic, just delicious. Sometime with a dash of sauce, lots to choose from.

Compost all kitchen scraps, but be sure to have some hay, dried leaves, wood chips, shredded paper, sugar cane mulch to cover the wet scraps each time you add to the compost bin. Turning a couple of times a week is best and is possible inside the bin with a Gardenmate (a large corkscrew tool) or a garden fork. Insert into compost and lift and shake the contents to incorporate air for the microbes. The Bokashi Bin is really handy for those in home units.

Chop and Drop Banana leaves and suckers but remember to core out the growing point or it will grow again. Make new beds by chop and drop and including sticks and small tree trunks when cleaning up. The trunks will break down over the hot wet months and feed the microbes in the soil. It is always advisable to never leave soil bare, either plant a cover crop or mulch.

Planting time for direct seeded veggies, amaranth, rocket, popcorn and sweetcorn, snake beans, Bok choy, Pak choy, mustard greens, gai choy, Green Gem cucumbers, radish, Timor lettuce and tropical lettuce, pumpkin, melons, and sweet potatoes. Rocket and lettuce seeds are difficult to germinate when hot, so buy some seedling for the early weeks.

Herbs to plant, all the basils, Mexican tarragon, mints, garlic chives, chives, shallots, lemon thyme, thyme, oregano and spices turmeric, ginger, galangal, cardamom, vanilla, Pandan and Five in one herb.

Seeding into punnets or pots is best done next month – March, they take about a month to get going and should be ready to plant out in April hopefully the heavy rain has stopped. Seedlings need to be under a roof to protect from heavy rain and hot sun, but where they still enough light to grow, if they become long spindly, they are not getting enough light.

Tomatoes, Capsicum, Egg Plant Tomatillo, Kale, Broccoli, Calabrese, Cabbage, will germinate now but need to be protected from heavy rain in March & really hot days. A shade cover for protecting seedlings can be made from a stiff fencing mesh curved over to make a tunnel, covered with shade cloth. Helps seedlings to adjust in day or two.

Flowers for the birds and bees: portulaca, marigold, coleus, sunflowers, basils all sorts, dianthus, five in one herb, bees also love flowering native plants, flowers on palm, pawpaw especially the males, bananas, shrubs and trees. I have native bees and they love salvia and Portulaca, and the butterflies love Pentas and Ixoras. I tried Queens Anne Lace it was beautiful and the bees loved it. Flowers and Pollination.
